During Lent certain areas of our church have been altered to express a symbolic message about this special season. For the next three weeks, Father Jozef will provide an explanation in the bulletin and Saint Matthew web/Facebook pages in order to allow each of us the opportunity to share in this spiritual message.

Week Four: Symbolism at Saint Matthew Gathering Space Cross ~ Draped in purple and a crown of thorns, the cross symbolizes Christ's sacrifice. At the foot of the cross are seven stones, each engraved with one of the deadly sins, and a lifeless urn. We are called to place our sins at the foot of the cross and ask for God's forgiveness and strength. Just as Jesus defeated sin and death He can transform us with our shortcomings into the people of faith, hope, and love. When you come to celebrate on Easter, please notice how God's love and the death and resurrection of Jesus have transformed the lifeless font. This is the same transformation we can experience in our own lives.

Stewardship Reflections You are like a grain of wheat. Keeping your time, talent, and treasure, to yourself yields no harvest. With God's grace we can die to ourselves and bear fruit for His kingdom. When you live for others, the evangelizing mission of Jesus Christ is revealed. Is God calling you to be charitable in a specific way this week?

We are called to detach from our own desires and entrust our lives to all that God has in store for us. As this Lenten season comes to a close, let us strive to partake in the richness God has offered to us through his covenant by more faithfully living out our call to be disciples of Christ, with frequent reception of the sacraments, and heartfelt service to our families and neighbors. On March 2, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' issued a statement on the COVID-19 vaccine "The approval of Johnson & Johnson's COVID-19 vaccine for use in the United States again raises questions about the moral permissibility of using vaccines developed, tested, and/or produced with the help of abortion-derived cell lines. "Pfizer and Moderna's vaccines raised concerns because an abortion-derived cell line was used for testing them, but not in their production. The Johnson & Johnson vaccine, however, was developed, tested and is produced with abortionderived cell lines raising additional moral concerns. The Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith has judged that 'when ethically irreproachable Covid-19 vaccines are not available ... it is morally acceptable to receive Covid-19 vaccines that have used cell lines from aborted fetuses in their research and production process.'[1] However, if one can choose among equally safe and effective COVID-

19 vaccines, the vaccine with the least connection to abortion-derived cell lines should be chosen. Therefore, if one has the ability to choose a vaccine, Pfizer or Moderna's vaccines should be chosen over Johnson & Johnson's.

Letter "Patris corde" ("With a Father's Heart"), our Holy Father, Pope Francis recalls the 150th anniversary of the declaration of Saint Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church. To mark the occasion, the Holy Father has proclaimed a "Year of Saint Joseph" beginning on the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary on December 8th, 2020 and extending it to the same Solemnity on December 8th, 2021. Mindful of this, we invite you to reflect on one of the most important saints of our Church - Saint Joseph. We don't know much about him except what is mentioned in the Gospels. Joseph lived in Nazareth, was the husband of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the foster-father of Jesus. Holy Scripture proclaims him as a "righteous or just man," and the Catholic Church has turned to Saint Joseph for his patronage and protection. The Church also dedicates the entire month of March to Saint Joseph and urges believers to pay special attention to his life and example. In the Gospels we will not find any words that Saint Joseph may have spoken. Even though we may look at him as a "silent or quiet saint", he speaks loudly because when God reached out to him he responded and from his trusting faith and actions we can certainly tell what kind of a person he was. We know that devotion to Saint Joseph has grown significantly throughout the history of the Church. I would like to encourage you to read "Patris corde" where pope Francis invites us to increase and strengthen our love for this great saint. May we as God's beloved children through the intercession of our mother Mary, her husband Saint Joseph cherish and celebrate God's great love and mercy for us and seek to bring them to all we meet and touch them with the same loving and merciful hand God has touched us.
