Fast and Abstinence during Holy Week – Canon 1251: Abstinence from eating meat or another food according to the prescriptions of the conference of bishops is to be observed on *Fridays throughout the year* unless they are solemnities; abstinence and fast are to be observed on *Friday of the Passion and Death of Our Lord Jesus Christ*. Canon 1252: All persons who have completed their 14th years are bound by the law of abstinence; all adults are bound by the law of fast up to the beginning of the 60th year.

The Triduum

Holy Thursday is the commemoration of the Last Supper of Jesus Christ, when he established the sacrament of Holy Communion prior to his arrest and crucifixion. It also commemorates His institution of the priesthood. The holy day falls on the Thursday before Easter and is part of Holy Week. Jesus celebrated the dinner as a Passover feast. Christ would fulfill His role as the Christian victim of the Passover for all to be saved by His final sacrifice.

Good Friday one of the most solemn days in the Christian liturgical calendar, marks the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. On this day, Catholics around the world engage in various practices to remember Christ's sacrifice, and among these is the Veneration of the Cross.

On Holy Saturday the earth waits in stillness for the Resurrection of the Lord. Every time we say the Creed, we note that Jesus "descended into hell." Holy Saturday is the day that commemorates this event. On Holy Saturday the Church is, as it were, at the Lord's tomb, meditating on his passion and death, and on his descent into hell, and awaiting his resurrection with prayer and fasting.

Pontifical Good Friday Collection — Pope Francis has asked our parish to support the Pontifical Good Friday Collection, which helps Christians in the Holy Land. Your support helps the church minister in parishes, provide Catholic schools, and offer religious education. The Pontifical Good Friday Collection also helps to preserve the sacred shrines. Most of them depend on pilgrimages to work. The Pontifical Good Friday Collection is also necessary to meet the basic needs of the People of God still living in this Land where the Church was born. When you contribute to the Pontifical Good Friday Collection you become an instrument of peace and join with Catholics around the world in solidarity with the Church in the Holy Land. What is Divine Mercy and how did it come about?

There was a young Polish nun named Sister Faustina Kowalska and in 1931 she began to have mysterious illuminations from Jesus. She kept a diary and Jesus communicated with her about His Divine Mercy. He talked about a feast day, (Divine Mercy Sunday) an image, (The Divine Mercy image) and very special prayers (The Chaplet and The Novena.) Jesus also told Sister Faustina that He wanted people to know about the promises of the Divine Mercy Novena. Jesus promised a profound and immense grace to those who would celebrate this feast of Divine Mercy. This grace is the forgiveness of all sins and the removal of all punishment due to sin.

What do I have to do to get the special grace?

- · Bring your Rosary and come to the Novena each day for 9 days.
- \cdot Say the special prayers and the chaplet.
- · Sincerely repent of all your sins.
- · Go to confession before Divine Mercy Sunday.
- · Celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday and receive Holy Communion.
- \cdot Place complete trust in Jesus.
- · Be merciful to others, through our actions, words, and prayers.
